Recently, I was speaking with our Club President, Gary Mize, and he suggested we should do a piece about Harriet Ham. In case you don't know, Harriet coordinates the Thursday Afternoon training sessions for novices and new club members.

I had a chat with Harriet on a recent Tuesday afternoon to get to know her a little better. Now, I would like to share with you what I learned about her and the Thursday Afternoon program she heads up. Harriet was born, spent her childhood and graduated from high school in South Carolina. She continued her education in South Carolina by obtaining a Bachelor's Degree in English. She also did graduate work there in reading. From South Carolina, she migrated to California where she met her husband and obtained her Masters in English. During that time, Harriet also earned a credential in learning disabilities. While in California, she taught reading and writing as a specialist working with students who had not yet learned to read for a variety of reasons.

After teaching, she decided to end her working career by becoming involved with real estate. Outside of work, her hobbies consisted of painting and making jewelry which she still does. Through friends of hers and her husband, they learned about The Grand. They both looked at homes here, liked what they saw and purchased a home here.

In her career, her strengths were organizing programs and sequencing skills within in order to accomplish her goals. These qualities enabled her to be quite successful. She has continued to exhibit those qualities in the Billiard Club. Harriet recognized a need to help new and novice members to improve their quality of play. She petitioned for and obtained a Thursday afternoon 2:00 – 4:00 PM time slot to achieve her goal. From her teaching experience, she utilizes sequence learning to help the attending trainees improve their level of play. After determining an individual's skill level, trainees are separated into groups and given a series of drills lasting between 45 minutes to an hour. During this time, Harriet goes around to see how the people are doing. Then attendees play games where each person uses the Ball in Hand playing technique. Approximately 6 to 15 club members attend these sessions.

She has persuaded and eventually recruited our very own pool training expert, Jerry Briesath along with Clyde Krebs to assist her in this endeavor. Several of her students have improved their level of play to become involved in club league activity. Harriet accepts club members and non-members that are considering becoming members between novice to mid-level skill levels. If any of you are interested in improving your level of play, there is a sign-up sheet located on the Billiards Room Bulletin Board.

Harriet and her Thursday Afternoon training sessions fill a need to both improve club members' ability to play and also helps recruit new members by giving them the support they need. The Club owes Harriet their gratitude for her dedication and expertise in coordinating this endeavor. Great Job Harriet!!

Rule of the Month: Pool Etiquette

As I stated earlier, the 2025 - 2026 Season is in full swing. Many Club members may not have played much during the summer months and thus might have forgotten some common pool etiquette rules that should be followed when your opponent is up and shooting. During non-league play, there may be more leeway between players to bend the following

rules as long as the participating players are OK with it. However, for League play, following are some common-sense Pool Etiquette rules that should be adhered to.

- 1. There is NO coaching to the player that is up and shooting. That player must decide what shot to take without any outside help.
- 2. Players near the pool table should keep conversations guiet and to a minimum.
- 3. Due to our pool rooms congested physical layout, don't walk through the center aisle while play is taking place. That activity can disturb a player's concentration and potentially mess up their shot.
- 4. There have been some recent occurrences of foul language being used when a shot has been missed. There is NO instance to use foul language in the Billiards Room. Please refrain from doing so.
- 5. Keeping your voice level to reasonable levels is paramount. Speaking in a loud tone can distract your fellow players so please speak at a reasonable level.

Adhering to the above rules will provide a more enjoyable environment for you and your fellow players.
